### Reportable Animal Diseases In Maryland – August 2022

**ATTENTION: Veterinarians:** State law requires that: “any person practicing veterinary medicine in the State shall report immediately to the Secretary any contagious or infectious disease among livestock or poultry of which he has knowledge. The report shall be in writing, and include a description of each animal affected, the name and exact address of the owner or person in charge of the animal, if known, the exact location of the animal, and number of susceptible domestic animals that have been exposed to the disease. **The report shall be made within 48 hours after the person knows of the disease**” (§3-104b of the Annotated Code of Maryland)

Collect nasal swab, red top and purple top tubes.
