### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S NOTES



FY 2012 was a busy year for the MALPF staff. In the 2012 legislative session, we made some major renovations to our governing law (Agriculture Article,  $\S 2-501 - 2-518$  of the Annotated Code of Maryland) mainly to remove all references to the MALPF districts. In addition to the MALPF legislation which will be discussed later, the passage of SB 236, The Sustainable Growth and Agricultural Preservation Act of 2012 (best known as "The Septics Bill") was passed. This bill signaled a change in the way development within the State will progress into the future. We will be able to purchase easements only in Tier 3 (areas not planned for sewerage service and containing but not dominated by agricultural or forest land) and Tier 4 (areas not planned for sewerage service that are planned or zoned for agricultural resource protection, preservation, or conservation, and is dominated by agricultural land, forest land, or other natural areas, Rural Legacy areas, and PPAs).

For the FY 2011 and FY 2012 easement acquisition cycles, we combined our funding to conduct one easement acquisition offer cycle and maximize the number of acres to be purchased. We had nearly \$30.4 million available for this cycle. Of this, almost \$8.7 million was county funding used to match state funds at a ratio of 60 percent state to 40 percent county dollars. This funding secured acceptances on 59 offers which represent almost 6,800 acres. At the end of FY 2012, we had purchased easements on a cumulative total of 2,078 properties, permanently preserving about 282,957 acres, at a total state investment of more than \$609 million.

We are looking forward to FY 2013 being equally, if not more, productive and exciting than 2012.

# **New Legislation**

The following bills were approved by the General Assembly in the 2012 legislative session:

•SB 129 - Elimination of Districts - The bill eliminated all reference to districts and district agreements since most districts were set to be terminated by July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2012 per previous legislation. It also authorized the assignment of un-terminated districts (those that have property tax credits attached to them) to the counties.

•SB 148 - Clarification of the Terms of Family Lots - This bill set 18 as the minimum age to receive a lot. It also set 3 years as the expiration of a preliminary release and allows the Foundation to grant an extension to the expiration. The bill authorized the Foundation to ask for evidence of occupancy and also provided that if the lot is not used for the owner or child for whom it was approved, then the Foundation may require it to be conveyed back to the easement.

•SB 112 - Termination – This legislation increased the requirement from 1 appraisal to 2 appraisals for use if an easement is being terminated (if a request for a 25-year out was granted). Two appraisals are standard for acquiring easements and for the disposition of property.

### **MALPF Easement Inspections**

Inspections are conducted to ensure compliance with the Deed of Easement. Occasionally, the inspections uncover problems or violations. Many violations are considered minor, such as outdated soil and water quality plans or forest management plans, and these are easily corrected once the landowner is notified. For more serious violations, MALPF staff attempts to work with landowners to resolve the problem.

One common problem is illegal agricultural subdivisions. Even if land placed under easement was comprised of separately deeded parcels, once under easement, these multiple parcels are joined as a whole and must stay together under common ownership. One individual parcel cannot be conveyed to someone else unless certain criteria are met and the conveyance is approved by the MALPF Board of Trustees. Each case gets examined by MALPF staff and in some situations, such as when size is a limiting factor, other solutions can come into play, such as combining the small parcel with an adjacent, eased parcel of land, or donating land to the easement to get the small parcel up to qualifying size. MALPF staff can get very creative in our attempts to assist landowners!

## **County Certification**

Certification of Local Agricultural Land Preservation Programs (the "Certification Program") was created by the Maryland General Assembly in 1990 and is jointly administered by MALPF and the Maryland Department of Planning. Program participation by interested counties is voluntary. As of July 1, 2012, fourteen Maryland counties are certified under this program: Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Caroline, Carroll, Cecil, Frederick, Harford, Kent, Montgomery, Queen Anne's, St. Mary's, Talbot, Washington, and Worcester.

The Certification Program allows counties to 1) create a preservation program that best meets local goals and needs, 2) retain greater portions of the Agricultural Transfer Tax (75% if certified, 33% if not certified) if they are able to demonstrate that they have an effective program to preserve agriculturally viable farmland, and 3) designate a Priority Preservation Area into which efforts and funds can be concentrated in order to preserve large contiguous blocks. The increase in a county's share of Agricultural Transfer Tax helps support its agricultural land preservation program by defining areas targeted for preservation and establishing acreage goals. All retained funds must be spent or encumbered for land preservation purposes within three years or the funds revert to MALPF.






# Agricultural Valuation Review

When a MALPF easement is purchased, the easement value is determined by subtracting the agricultural value (as determined by the Agricultural Value Formula) from the appraised fair market value. The MALPF Board of Trustees is always concerned that easement values are fair and equitable across the State. In order to ensure an even playing field, in April, 2011 the Board appointed an Easement Valuation Committee to consider whether the current agricultural land valuation method accurately reflects market value and consider how it compares and contrasts with other valuation systems in use by surrounding states.

The Committee has studied several potential alternative valuation methods but has not yet reached a decision of what, if any, changes may be necessary.
